"Midnight Wilderness: Journeys in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge," by Debbie Miller. A collection of personal essays spanning 20 years of exploration in the Refuge. Weaves in history, politics and natural history.

"Arctic Dreams: Imagination and Desire in a Northern

Landscape," by Barry Lopez. Not specifically about the Refuge but one of the best natural history books about the Arctic world.

"A Naturalist's Guide to the Arctic," by E.C. Pielou — The best book on the plants, animals and landscapes of the Arctic. An excellent reference.
