

The Burgess Shale Geoscience Foundation is offering two special tours in 2005 for members, friends, and patrons of the Burke Museum. The package includes a full-day guided hike, breakfast and lunch, and two nights accommodation at the scenic Kicking Horse Lodge.\* The dates are:

- August 2-4**  
(hike on Wednesday, August 3)
- August 9-11**  
(hike on Wednesday, August 10)

### The Hike

The hike to the Burgess Shale site is moderately strenuous, with a round-trip distance of 12 miles and an elevation gain of 2,500 feet. A licensed guide from the Geoscience Foundation sets a pace that is comfortable for the group, with occasional stops to rest, learn about natural history, and admire the spectacular scenery.

The trail begins near thundering Takakkaw Falls, follows the switchbacks near Whiskey Jack Creek to tree-lined Yoho Lake, and from there ascends gradually to broad and breathtaking views of Emerald Lake and the President Range.

The quarry site is located in the middle range of Fossil Ridge at 7,400 feet. Here, the guide will point out the location of historic excavations and share examples of some of the most fascinating fossils found here. The whole trip generally takes about 10 hours.

The Burgess Shale quarry is a protected UNESCO world heritage site. Access is possible *only* on a guided tour. Fossils can be held and examined but not removed.

Weather note: While August is the sunniest time to visit Yoho Park, the weather can turn cold and rainy. You will receive a list of recommended gear and clothing with your registration confirmation.

\* Other accommodations, including campgrounds and hostels, are available if you prefer to make your own alternate arrangements. ### Registration & Refund Policy

Registration, hike fee, and one day's hotel cost are due to the Burgess Shale Geoscience Foundation by April 1, 2005. The remaining hotel fee is payable to the hotel at the end of your stay.

Hike registrations are nonrefundable, except under extenuating circumstances approved by the director. A \$20 (Canadian) fee will be charged for any changes to your reservation after confirmation. Hotel cancellations received 7 days prior to the reservation are refundable minus a \$25 (CAD) cancellation fee.

If bad weather prevails, the Foundation will attempt to provide an alternate program or hike. A phone contact will be requested where you can be reached in the days before the hike.



The 505 million-year-old Burgess Shale fossils have been called the most important animal fossils in the world. Hike participants will have a chance to see examples such as these below:




