Rarely do we see or talk about the works created for our children. I do not know why so few artworks in museum collections show the reverence our people have for our children. Perhaps the pieces were destroyed when our children were taken from us and sent to government boarding schools (also called Indian residential schools in Canada). Maybe parents and grandparents hid these artworks in hopes these works would someday be reunited with our children.
